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Dear Governor Crist and Fellow Floridians:

The Florida Interagency Coordinating Council for Infants and Toddlers (FICCIT), is pleased to submit this annual report for the Birth to Three System (Florida's Early Steps). The FICCIT is charged by Federal law to advise and assist the state lead agency in making decisions that affect Florida's system of early intervention. This report covers the period from July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2008 and includes information about the status of Florida's Early Steps.

Early Steps is a collaborative partnership between providers, families, local Early Steps, state agencies and the Council to provide services for infants and toddlers who have developmental delays or an established condition likely to result in a developmental delay that supports children's well-being and development where they live, learn and play. As the parent of two children who benefited from Florida's Early Steps, I am encouraged by the level of partnership that exists. Working together makes it possible to expand and improve the services available to Florida's infants and toddlers who have disabilities and their families.

During this past year, we have enjoyed successes and have encountered challenges. One challenge to Florida's Early Steps is a result of the extraordinary job the lead agency does with Child Find. The referral rate to Early Steps increased 7.9% over the previous year, bringing the total number served to 37,876. This consistent growth places greater demands on the program to deliver services to more and more families each year.

This past year, our successes include:

- The Family Leadership Committee has worked collaboratively with the local Early Steps to hold quarterly Conversations with Families. These have been very successful with families sharing successes and challenges of the program throughout the state. The Committee also compiled data on these events to assist with decision making of the statewide program, collaborating with local grass root family organizations/groups and developing outcomes and goals for the committee.
- The Public Affairs Committee revised an informational palm card to be distributed at conferences and public events for use in recruiting family members to the FICCIT. This committee also developed this annual report, which is designed to provide an overview of the status of early intervention services in the state.
- The Personnel Development and Training Committee members have worked diligently to develop and implement a strategic plan to address key areas of need related to training and professional development based on the most recent Annual Performance Report. One highlight of the year has been the implementation of a recommendation for the establishment of local training coordinators within each of the 15 local Early Steps. Conversations with Providers have continued with excellent feedback received.

On behalf of Florida's infants and toddlers and their families, we thank you for your continued support of Florida's Early Steps.

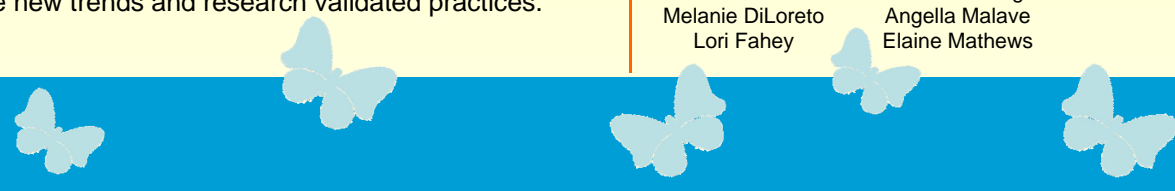

Florida's **Early Steps** offers early intervention services to families with infants and toddlers (birth to 36 months) who have developmental delays or an established condition likely to result in a developmental delay. Services are based on the concerns, priorities and resources identified by the child's family as part of their Individualized Family Support Plan team. Early Steps coordinates available resources and is the payer of last resort.

Many types of specialized services are available through Early Steps for eligible children and their families, such as:

- identification
- multidisciplinary evaluations
- service coordination
- individualized family support planning
- intervention services, therapies and supports
- hearing and vision services

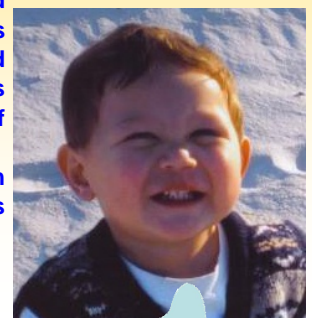
Early Steps services are provided by contracted local offices across the state that coordinate with community agencies and providers for the delivery of needed supports and services. The services are delivered within the everyday routines, activities, and places of the child and family. The Early Steps system is administered by The Florida Department of Health, Children's Medical Services Network in accordance with the Federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, Part C.

2007-2008 Accomplishments

- Designed and developed Early Steps (ES) Policy Handbook and Operations Guide system that became effective March 1, 2008. The new ES Policies are more concise, family-friendly, and web-enabled.
- Provided funding for the purchase of laptop computers for all Service Coordinators throughout the state. Additionally, the ES State Office (ESSO) arranged for the Local Early Steps to take advantage of low state contract rates for Verizon services to get wireless connectivity on the laptops.
- Developed and signed an interagency agreement between the Department of Health and the Department of Children and Families which focuses on the process for referral to Early Steps of infants and toddlers who are potentially eligible for early intervention services, and who are involved in substantiated cases of child abuse or neglect.
- Participated on the Governor's Task Force on Autism Spectrum Disorders. The task force is designed to advance public policy for addressing autism in Florida, and Early Steps provides information about early intervention to the group.
- Improved overall statewide performance on timely service delivery, developing an Individualized Family Support Plan within 45 days of the child's referral to Early Steps, and conducting a transition conference for children turning 3.
- Added the ability to post job opportunities for local Early Steps agencies on the ESSO website. This should enhance our recruitment activities.
- Improved our Professional Development efforts without additional costs by creating Training Coordinator responsibilities at each local Early Steps.

Spencer was born in 2006 with a cleft lip and we knew there was a possibility for speech problems. In November 2007, he was evaluated for a speech delay and we were told that he needed speech therapy twice a week. Soon after that evaluation we began speech therapy at Pearl Nelson Center. Alita, his speech therapist, has a very loud and bubbly personality which is the exact opposite of Spencer. Spencer was very quiet and a serious child. He also would become very frustrated because he could not communicate his needs to us. Since then he has worked hard to improve his speech and he and Alita are best friends. We could not have picked a better therapist to help him. He is a very happy child now and can say many words clearly. Although he still talks with a nasal tone at times, his speech has improved and it is all because of the wonderful programs that Early Steps offers! Everyone that has helped my son has been fabulous and his speech really has improved with the help of his therapist and teacher, Emily. We are forever grateful for the help he has received!

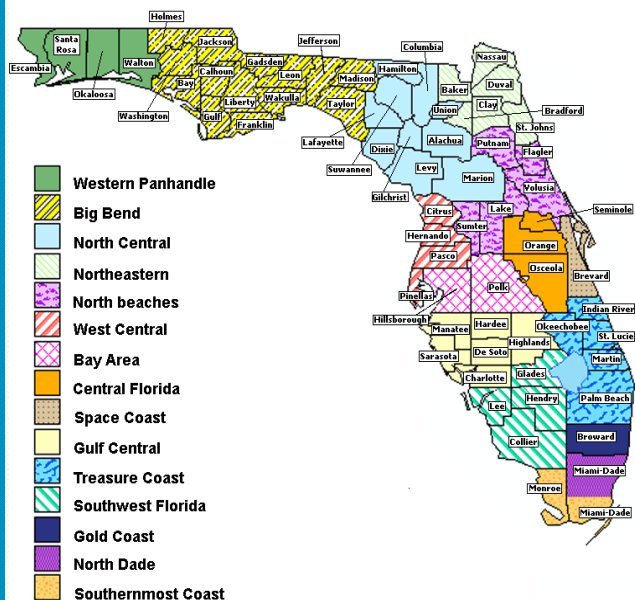

37,691 children received Early Steps services in Florida during the past year.

After having six healthy children, it never occurred to us things might go differently with our seventh child. So my husband and I were stunned when we were told our unborn baby girl had Spina Bifida.

In the weeks that followed her diagnosis, we learned what a serious condition this was. Unable to feel anything from the waist down due to an opening in her spine, walking and other normal functions many of us take for granted would be difficult or impossible for our daughter.

Following Jordan's birth, there were many anxious days. It was a difficult and scary time for our family. Although we wanted to do anything we could to help our daughter, we didn't even know where to begin. Thankfully, into this traumatic time stepped Early Steps.

The Early Steps program assessed not only Jordan's medical needs but our needs as a family. They quickly established us with an exceptional pediatric physical therapist who has taught us many exercises to build Jordan's physical strength. We now have access to educational programs, to advisors when we have questions or need guidance, and to physical therapy equipment. Through their guidance, I have also been empowered to become an advocate for Jordan's needs as they arise. Furthermore, I have been encouraged through books from their lending library to develop a new vision for Jordan's future. Greatest of all, because of our involvement with Early Steps, we can now look forward with hope and confidence to a bright future for our daughter.

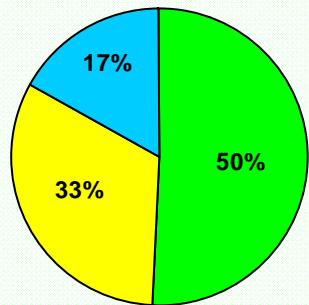


Early Intervention Works

“Participation in Florida’s Early Intervention Program [Early Steps] reduced the need for placement in kindergarten exceptional student education for all infants regardless of birth weight. Even children who face the most serious challenges to developing school readiness, infants born less than 750 grams [1 lb. 10 oz.], benefited from participation in EIP [Early Intervention Programs]: 40 percent of them no longer required placement in Kindergarten ESE [Exceptional Student Education].”

A Family-Centered Approach

Early Steps recognizes parents are a child’s first teachers, and the involvement of family is essential to supporting a child’s development. Early intervention increases opportunities for infants and toddlers with disabilities to integrate into their communities and enhances the ability of families to meet their child’s developmental needs.

Early Steps partners with parents, focusing on the family as a unit. Families and caregivers are involved in all aspects of decision making, provided sufficient information to make informed decisions, and supported in developing the skills necessary to meet their child’s needs.

A Family Resource Specialist (FRS), knowledgeable in all of the services available to the family both within and outside of Early Steps, is assigned to each family. From arranging therapists for the child to identifying respite opportunities for parents and assisting with the transition out of Early Steps at age three, the Family Resource Specialist is key to the Early Steps approach, empowering families with training and support to increase the learning opportunities for their children.

I’m the mother of five beautiful children - four boys and a beautiful girl. Her name is Isabella and she was born with Down Syndrome. We were given a prenatal diagnosis two years ago so we had plenty of time to prepare emotionally and instructively for her arrival.

No sooner was our daughter born then we were on our way to Children’s Diagnostic and Treatment Center (CDTC) to enroll her in Early Steps. There we met with many people who have helped us tremendously along the road we now travel.

We were offered an evaluation and many diverse plans to help Isabella reach her maximum potential. We were given realistic ideas for what she would be able to accomplish if we followed the suggested plans for early intervention. Early Steps set up her therapies and continuously offered us support to help our family deal with the many different aspects of having a child with disabilities.

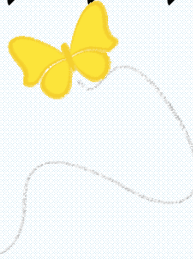
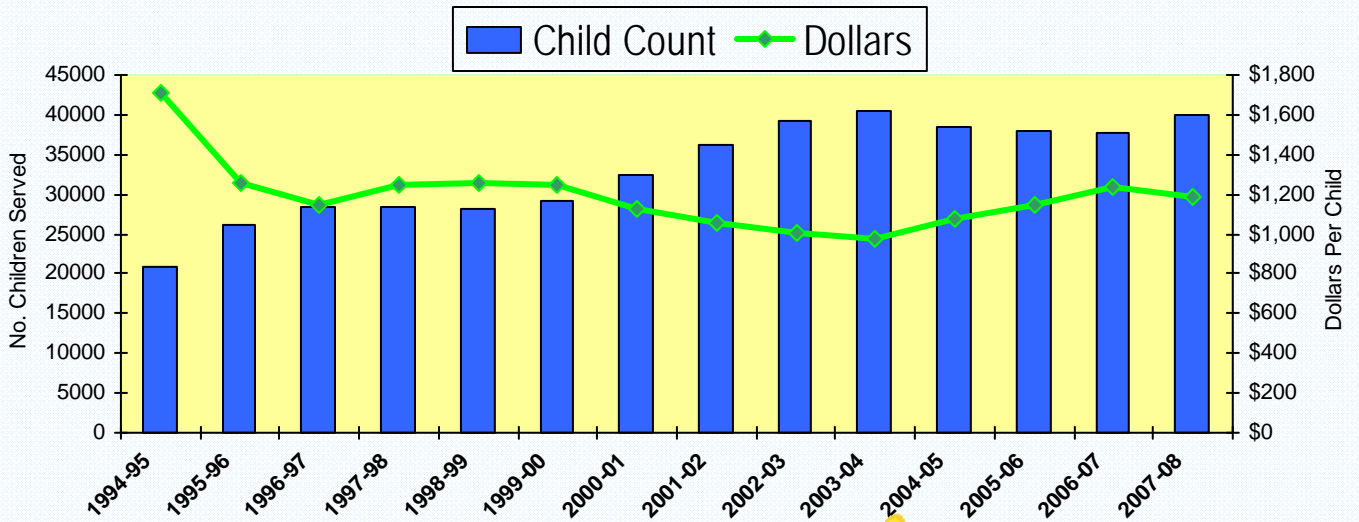

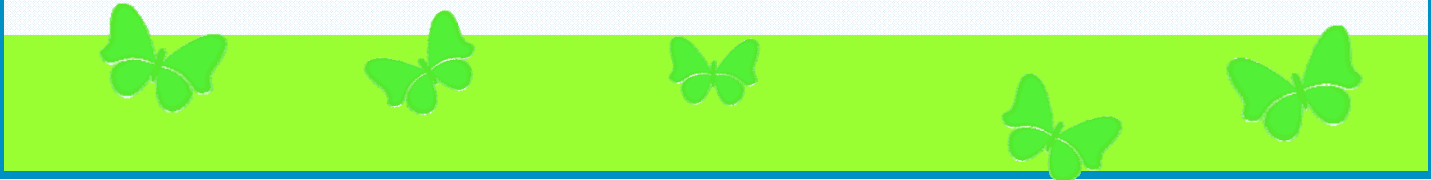
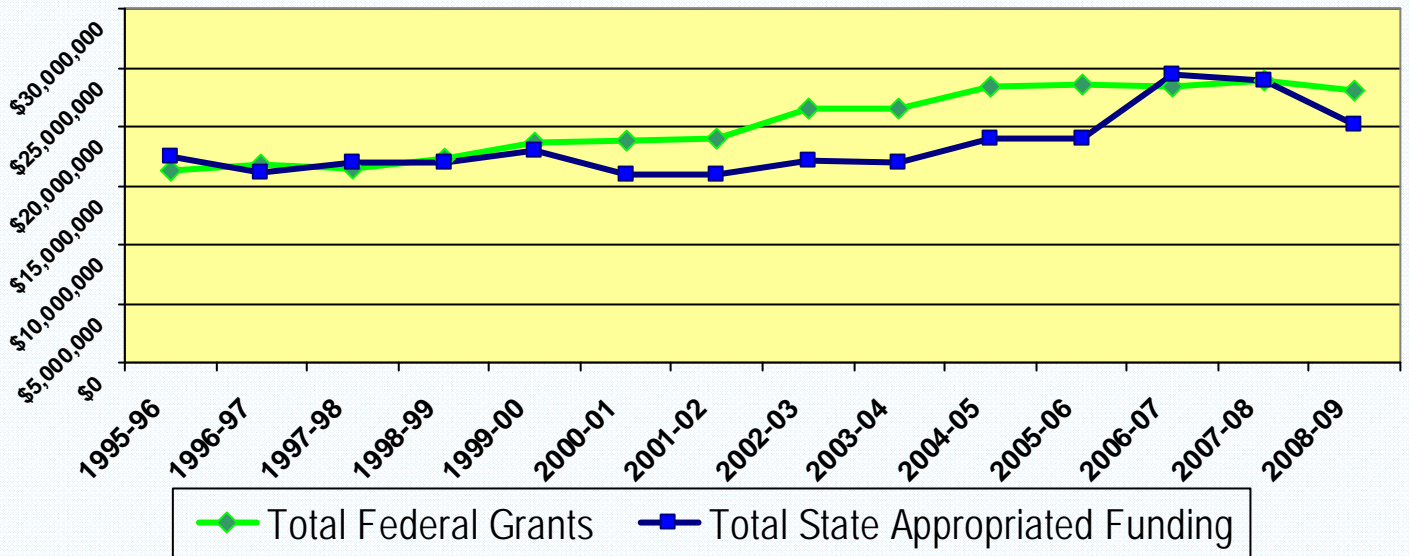




History of Per Child Early Steps Funding

Another Success Story

Kayla has faced physical challenges from the day she was born. On that day, all of her organs were failing except for her heart and lungs, she was having seizures, and had only 10% of the required blood so she needed 4 blood transfusions. After her organs repaired themselves and the seizures stopped, I finally took my baby home. The next several months were very hard for us. Besides being a mom to an infant with special needs and taking care of the rest of my family, I constantly wondered if she was going to be disabled. So the hardest part was dealing with all these new emotions.



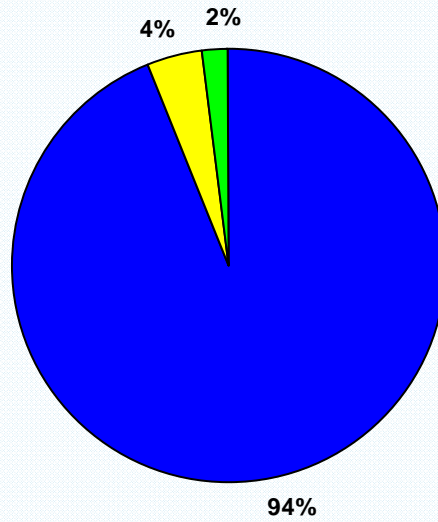
Over the next two years tremendous things happened. Kayla was diagnosed at 6 months with Spastic Quadriplegia Cerebral Palsy, which led to numerous tests to find out the extent of the brain damage. We enrolled with Early

Steps and received services at the Children's Rehab Center. Those most helpful throughout this time were the therapists at CRC and the caring staff at Early Steps. Not only for being there to answer all of my questions and help me with education material, but also for support, socialization through the playgroups, and much needed equipment for Kayla.

Although being a single parent to a special needs child can be emotionally and physically draining, the reward is far greater than I could ever imagine. I wake up everyday to a smiling face, so pure, innocent, happy and healthy. Kayla has given me strength and hope; she has taught me to be humble and not take things for granted. I am so thankful to have Kayla in my life, and I wouldn't change a thing.

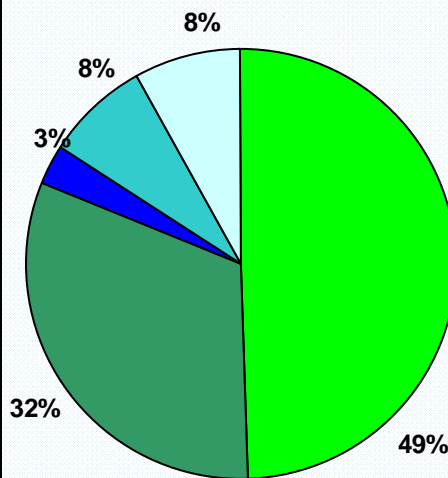
Allocation of Early Steps Dollars 2007-2008
